# **Questions for Families**

Here are some questions you can discuss with the whole family.

#### Acts 17:1-9

## Why did Paul go to the synagogue first in Thessalonica?

Guide your child to see that Paul started there because people knew about God. Younger kids can think about familiar places to talk with friends, while older ones might discuss sharing ideas with people who have similar backgrounds.

## How did Paul help people understand who Jesus is?

Encourage younger kids by comparing it to explaining a favorite story. Older kids can talk about how explaining and reasoning helps change minds.

# Why were some people mad at Paul and Silas, and what should we do when we're challenged for doing right?

For younger kids, relate it to saying no when something isn't good, while older kids can discuss the importance of sticking to beliefs despite challenges.



# Commentary

#### Notes:

#### A Bit of Background

To fully appreciate this section of Acts, it's helpful to know a bit about what's happening in the world at the time. Thessalonica, a large city in ancient Macedonia (now part of modern-day Greece), was a vibrant hub of trade and culture during the first century. It was part of the Roman Empire, which meant it had a mix of people with different beliefs and practices. Some people believed in the traditional Greek and Roman gods, while others, like the Jewish community, worshipped the one God of Israel.

This diverse setting is key to why Thessalonica was an important stop for Paul. He sought places where he could reach a variety of people with different backgrounds. By starting his teaching in the synagogue, he aimed to ground his message in the familiar before expanding his audience to include non-Jewish people intrigued by Jewish beliefs.

The passage also highlights the risks Paul and Silas took. Claiming Jesus as King was potentially dangerous under Roman rule, where pledging loyalty to the emperor was expected. The mob that formed against them illustrates the social and political pressures they faced. Despite these challenges, Paul and Silas's mission was all about spreading God's message, even when it stirred up trouble.

### What's Going On?

In Acts 17:1-9, we follow Paul and his companion Silas as they journey into the bustling city of Thessalonica. This part of the story is exciting because it shows how Paul shares the message of Jesus with people who might not have heard it before. When Paul and Silas arrive, they head straight for the synagogue-that's a place where Jewish people gather to worship and learn about God. Paul uses the synagogue as a starting point because the people there already have some background knowledge, like a shared understanding of the Old Testament and its prophecies about the Messiah. Over three weeks, Paul reasons with them using scriptures, explaining who Jesus is and how he fulfills those prophecies.

This approach is smart: Paul builds on what the people already know, which makes his message more relatable and understandable. His words persuade many, not just Jews but also God-fearing Greeks and prominent women, showing that the message of Jesus resonates across different groups. However, not everyone is convinced. By including phrases like "the Jews became jealous," the passage reveals tension and conflict. Paul and Silas's success stirs up jealousy among some Jewish leaders, leading to opposition. It's an intense moment—we see how sharing the message of Jesus can sometimes upset people who feel threatened by it.

# Sermon Notes

#### Acts 17:1-9 CSB

After they passed through Amphipolis and Apollonia, they came to Thessalonica, where there was a Jewish synagogue. As usual, Paul went into the synagogue, and on three Sabbath days reasoned with them from the Scriptures, explaining and proving that it was necessary for the Messiah to suffer and rise from the dead: "This Jesus I am proclaiming to you is the Messiah." Some of them were persuaded and joined Paul and Silas, including a large number of God-fearing Greeks, as well as a number of the leading women. But the Jews became jealous, and they brought together some wicked men from the marketplace, formed a mob, and started a riot in the city. Attacking Jason's house, they searched for them to bring them out to the public assembly. When they did not find them, they dragged Jason and some of the brothers before the city officials, shouting, "These men who have turned the world upside down have come here too, and Jason has welcomed them. They are all acting contrary to Caesar's decrees, saying that there is another king Jesus." The crowd and city officials who heard these things were upset. After taking a security bond from Jason and the others, they released them.
