Questions for Families

Here are some questions you can discuss with the whole family.

1 Thessalonians 5:12-13

How can you show someone you love and respect them?

For younger children, guide them to simple answers like "smile" or "listening to them" For older children and teens, discuss actions like protecting their reputation in conversation, not complaining, or honoring their leadership.

What makes it hard to listen to advice that you don't like from trusted family or leaders?

For younger children, focus on the trust relationship: "We listen because they love us." For older children and teens, discuss the humility required to receive correction and how respectful listening contributes to a peaceful relationships.

How can you make the leaders (parents, teachers, Bible study leaders etc.) in your life feel loved this week?

For ages younger children, focus on simple acts of service like making a drawing or giving a card. For older children and teens, discuss thoughtful actions like sending an email of encouragement, saying thank you.

Notes:

What's Going On?

The first three chapters of 1 Thessalonians are focused on encouraging the believers in their faith and persecution. Starting in Chapter 4, Paul pivots to giving very clear, practical instructions on Christian living, or what we call "sanctification." This includes instructions on how to treat each other, how to live with moral purity, and how to work honestly.

Chapter 5 begins with a powerful discussion of the timing of Christ's return (the Day of the Lord), urging them to stay spiritually sober and watchful. Then, right after this weighty theological teaching, Paul launches directly into a series of short, straightforward commands in verses 12 through 22. This section acts as a spiritual checklist for healthy church life. By placing respect for the hard-working elders right at the start of this list of duties, Paul highlights that church order and appreciation for those who spiritually guide you are foundational to a peaceful, well-functioning Christian community. This respect is key to fulfilling the final command in the passage: "Live in peace with each other."

A Bit of Background

The letter of 1 Thessalonians was written by the Apostle Paul around 50-51 AD, making it one of the very first books of the New Testament. He was writing to a young church he had started in the major port city of Thessalonica, located in modern-day Greece. Paul's time there was short, only about three weeks, as recorded in the book of Acts, before intense opposition forced him and his companions to leave. The fledgling Christian community, made up mostly of Gentiles, was immediately facing tough times and persecution from their neighbors.

Paul was worried they might give up on their faith. He wrote this letter from Corinth after receiving a positive report from his co-worker, Timothy. Timothy confirmed that the church was strong in faith and love, despite the suffering. Paul is writing to a community under stress that needs concrete, practical instructions on how to live together while waiting for Christ to return. They were concerned about confusing ideas, especially about Jesus's Second Coming, and they needed guidance on daily behavior.
