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Questions for Families

Here are some questions you can discuss with the whole family.

<u>1 Corinthians 11:17-28</u>

What do you think God wants us to remember when we eat the bread and drink the cup?

Guide for parents: Encourage young children to think about how the bread and cup can remind us of Jesus and his love. Older children might consider how it shows Jesus' sacrifice and how we should remember his teachings.

Why do you think it's important for everyone to share and be united at the Lord's Supper?

Guide for parents: Help younger kids understand the importance of being friends and including everyone. For older kids, discuss how unity and equality among believers reflect God's love and the message of the gospel.

How can we make sure that we're showing love and kindness during the Lord's Supper and every day?

Guide for parents: With younger kids, talk about simple acts of kindness and sharing. Older kids might explore deeper ideas like confessing when we're wrong and striving to treat others with fairness and compassion, just as the passage encourages.


A Bit of Background

Now, let's look at the situation in Corinth back in Paul's time. Corinth was a big, bustling city with people from all over the place. It had a mix of cultures and religions, making it a vibrant but chaotic place. The early Christian Church in Corinth was a pretty diverse group, with folks from different backgrounds, social classes, and ethnicities. This diversity was both a strength and a challenge. Back then, sharing a meal was a big deal, often reserved fo close friends or equals, and the Lord's Supper was supposed to celebrate unity among believers. But the Corinthians were mixing their social habits with their new faith.

They let their social divisions seep into their worship, which is why some people were being left out. People with more wealth or higher social status were likely showing up and treating the meal as their own private party, forgetting what it represented. The Corinthian church's struggles remind us that even in the early days, Christians were working out how to live out their faith in a community, as they navigated their differences and learned how to come together as one body in Christ.

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Humble Guide - Force for Good

Sermon Notes

1 Corinthians 11:17-28 CSB

Now in giving this instruction I do not praise you, since you come together not for the better but for the worse. For to begin with, I hear that when you come together as a church there are divisions among you, and in part I believe it. Indeed, it is necessary that there be factions among you, so that those who are approved may be recognized among you. When you come together, then, it is not to eat the Lord's Supper. For at the meal, each one eats his own supper. So one person is hungry while another gets drunk! Don't you have homes in which to eat and drink? Or do you despise the church of God and humiliate those who have nothing? What should I say to you? Should I praise you? I do not praise you in this matter! For I received from the Lord what I also passed on to you: On the night when he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, broke it, and said, "This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way also he took the cup, after supper, and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. So, then, whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of sin against the body and blood of the Lord. Let a person examine himself; in this way let him eat the bread and drink from the cup.
