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Application Questions | 3

Questions for Families

Here are some questions you can discuss with the whole family.

<u>Romans 1:16-17</u>

What do these verses tell us about God's power and how it helps us?

Guide young children by explaining that God's power, like a loving force, can change our hearts and encourage us to share kindness. For older children, discuss how this power shows itself through Jesus's resurrection and brings salvation to all who believe.

How do these verses help us understand what it means to have faith?

For younger children, explain faith as trusting God, similar to trusting parents to care for them. With older kids, discuss living by faith through their actions and beliefs and relate them to their daily experiences.

What can we do to show we are not embarrassed about our faith in Jesus, like Paul said?

Suggest simple expressions for younger children, like saying a prayer at meals. For older children, explore how they can express their faith in various situations, such as standing up for what's right at school or sharing positive messages with friends.

Commentary

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What's Going On?

Romans 1:16-17 is a key passage where the Apostle Paul boldly declares he is "not ashamed of the gospel," emphasizing its power for salvation to everyone who believes. In this sermon, these verses are explored to highlight what Paul means by the "gospel" and why it is powerful. The passage continues to explain that the righteousness of God is revealed in the gospel, a righteousness that is grasped by faith, meaning a trust in God that involves both belief and action. Paul is passionate about this message, and he wants everyone, Jews and Gentiles alike, to understand and experience it.

He stresses that the gospel is a gift from God, not just a set of teachings or commandments, but a life-transforming power tied to faith. Instead of focusing solely on individual salvation, Paul wants his audience to see how the gospel affects communities and cultures, urging them to live out their faith and contribute to bringing God's kingdom to earth now. This sets the tone for the rest of the letter, where Paul addresses various aspects of faith, obedience, and the broader impact of living out the Gospel message.



A Bit of Background

To appreciate this passage, it's helpful to know about life during Paul's time. He wrote this letter to the Romans around A.D. 57, a time when the Roman Empire was the dominant power in the world. Life was tough, especially for Jewish and early Christian communities who found themselves marginalized or outright persecuted. Paul was a Roman citizen and a former Pharisee before converting to Christianity. He reached out to both Jews and Gentiles because he believed that what Jesus did—living a sinless life, dying on the cross, and rising from the dead—was for everyone.

The idea of resurrection was radical, especially for the Roman world where the power was often associated with military might and political control, not sacrifice and renewal. Paul's boldness in proclaiming the gospel came from his personal transformation and his encounter with the risen Christ. He viewed the gospel not just as another philosophy but as God's powerful intervention in history, inviting all people to trust in God's righteousness rather than their own efforts. This historical backdrop helps us appreciate why Paul insisted the gospel could unify diverse groups and provide hope amidst the challenges of his time.

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
