## Introduction

How do we respond when those closest to us betray or hurt us? John 13 offers a profound model through Jesus' interactions with Judas at the Last Supper. Despite knowing Judas would betray Him, Jesus humbly served and loved him to the end. This radical love challenges us to forgive and love our own "enemies," turning the natural impulse for retaliation into an opportunity for grace. As we explore this passage, let's consider how we can embody Jesus' example of unconditional love and mercy in our own lives.

- 2. In what ways does the relationship between Jesus and Judas challenge our understanding of love and forgiveness?
- 3. How does the seating arrangement at the Last Supper (with Judas in the seat of honor) impact your view of Jesus' love for His enemies?
- 4. Reflect on Pastor Robby's statement,
  "The true test of a Christian is not how
  you love Jesus, but how you love the
  Judases of the world." What does this
  mean in practical terms for how
  believers should conduct themselves in
  their relationships with others?

#### **APPLY**

Discuss the following questions...

- How can you apply the example of Jesus' love for Judas to situations in your life where you have been wronged or betrayed by others?
- 2. When faced with conflict or betrayal, how can you intentionally choose forgiveness and love over retaliation and anger?
- 3. How do you need to die to self in your daily life to better follow Jesus' teachings?
- 4. What actions can you take to mentor and disciple others in demonstrating Christlike love and forgiveness?

### RESPOND

Force for Good: In what ways can the practice of servanthood, as demonstrated by Jesus washing the disciples' feet, be incorporated into your daily interactions with family, friends, and colleagues?

### **Prayer:**

Pray for the strength to love like Jesus, even in the face of betrayal or hurt. Ask God to help each group member die to self and live fully for Christ.

# Questions for Families

Here are some questions you can discuss with the whole family.

#### John 13:1-5

What do you think Jesus was feeling when He washed the disciples' feet, even knowing one of them would betray Him?

For younger children, encourage them to think about emotions like kindness and sadness. For older children, discuss deeper feelings like love and forgiveness despite betrayal.

What can we learn about our own actions from how Jesus treated Judas? Guide younger children to see how they can be nice to friends and even those who aren't nice to them. With older children, explore the idea of showing kindness and forgiveness even when others may not deserve it.

How do you think we can show love to others like Jesus did, even if they might not be our friends?

With younger children, talk about simple acts of sharing and kindness. For older children, delve into more complex actions like forgiving someone who has hurt them or choosing to be understanding and patient.



# Commentary

#### Notes:

#### What's Going On?

In the book of John, chapter 13 takes us into a fascinating scene known as the Last Supper. This moment happens just before Jesus faces His betrayal and crucifixion. Imagine a crowded room with Jesus and His disciples preparing to have a significant meal together. This isn't just any meal; it's a Passover supper, which is a Jewish tradition celebrating the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt.

During this meal, Jesus decides to wash His disciples' feet, an act of humility and love. Surprisingly, even Judas, who would soon betray Jesus, has his feet washed. This moment highlights Jesus' incredible capacity to serve and love everyone. The passage sets the stage for Jesus showing ultimate love and sacrifice, urging us to reflect on how we practice humility and forgiveness in our lives.

### A Bit of Background

This event occurs during a critical time in Jewish tradition — the Passover festival. During Passover, Jewish people celebrate their deliverance from slavery in Egypt, which adds layers of meaning to Jesus' actions. Jesus is often referred to as the "Lamb of God," which ties into the Passover lambs that were sacrificed. The sacrifice and redemption themes during Passover highlight what Jesus is about to do through His death and resurrection.

Judas Iscariot, a key figure in this chapter, was distinctive among the disciples. Unlike the others, he wasn't from Galilee. He came from a place known for its anti-Roman sentiments, which might have influenced his actions and mindset. Jesus' choice to include Judas among His closest followers despite knowing Judas would betray Him shows another level of the story's depth. It fulfills Old Testament prophecies and demonstrates Jesus' commitment to His mission.

Understanding the cultural and historical aspects of John 13 helps illuminate why Jesus' actions and teachings during the Last Supper are so crucial. They remind us that love and service transcend our circumstances, inviting us to live with grace and compassion.

#### John 13:1-5 CSB

Before the Passover Festival, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. Now when it was time for supper, the devil had already put it into the heart of Judas, Simon Iscariot's son, to betray him. Jesus knew that the Father had given everything into his hands, that he had come from God, and that he was going back to God. So he got up from supper, laid aside his outer clothing, took a towel, and tied it around himself. Next, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet and to dry them with the towel tied around him.
