## APPLY

Discuss the following questions...

- 1. If God can save Paul, he can save anyone. How does this truth impact your view of evangelism and your own faith journey?
- 2. What are some forms of spiritual blindness we might encounter today?
- 3. How does the idea that "God made the first move" in salvation impact your understanding of your relationship with God?
- 4. Discuss the three elements of a Christian testimony: life before Christ, the moment of conversion, and life after, and how you see those in your own story.

## RESPOND

Force for Good: The story here with Ananias shows the importance of intimacy with the Lord and following where he leads. Ananias was an instrument used by God to help reach Saul. How do we as followers of Jesus keep in step with Him and follow where He leads?

## Prayer:

Close in prayer by thanking God for His relentless pursuit of us, even when we were far from Him. Ask for the courage to respond to His call and for eyes to see where He is working in our lives and the lives of those around us.

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# **Questions for Families**

Here are some questions you can discuss with the whole family.

## <u>Acts 9:1-19</u>

#### What does this Scripture about Saul and Jesus tell us about who God is?

Guide for Discussion: For younger children, talk about how God is loving and powerful enough to change even the biggest troubles into good things. Older children can discuss how God is always reaching out to people, even those who might seem too far gone, and how He is willing to forgive and give new chances.

# How do you think Saul's change on the road to Damascus helps us think about ourselves?

Guide for Discussion: Encourage younger kids to think about how everyone can change and grow, even when they make mistakes. For older children, discuss how we all have the ability to learn and become better individuals through Jesus and how our past doesn't have to define our future.

## How do you think our lives change because of meeting Jesus?

Guide for Discussion: With younger children, focus on being kind to others. Older kids can explore the idea of embracing forgiveness and new beginnings, just like Saul did when he became Paul. Talk about how we can help others see the good news of love and hope through our actions.

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#### A Bit of Background

Let's step back and think about the world Saul lived in. During this time, after Jesus' resurrection and ascension into heaven, the number of his followers—Christians—began to grow. But not everyone was happy about this new movement. Many Jewish leaders felt threatened. They believed in strictly following Jewish laws and traditions, and they saw followers of Jesus as a challenge to their religious way of life. Saul was one of the most zealous among them. Educated by the esteemed Rabbi Gamaliel, Saul took his mission seriously, believing he was protecting his faith by silencing Christians.

However, God had bigger plans. Saul, who would later be known as Paul, was chosen to play a special role in spreading Jesus' message far beyond the Jewish communities, reaching the Gentiles, who are non-Jews. This was a major change because it showed that the good news of Jesus was for everyone, not just a select group of people.

This moment in history was pivotal. It marked the beginning of the Christian message spreading to different cultures and communities around the world. Saul's transformation into Paul is about how God can use anyone to accomplish His plans, no matter their past. And that's a message that continues to inspire many people today.
