Prayer:

Pray together, focusing on persistence, faith, and consistency in your prayer lives. Encourage group members to pray for each other's "impossible" requests throughout the week.

Questions for Families

Here are some questions you can discuss with the whole family.

Luke 18:1-8

What do you think this Scripture shows us about God and how He listens to us?

Guide younger children by discussing how God is always listening and wants to help us. For older kids, explore the idea of God being much more caring than the unjust judge and how He responds out of love.

How do you think the widow felt when she kept asking the judge for help? Do you think we can feel the same way sometimes when we pray?

With younger children, use examples of times they've had to keep asking for something. Encourage older children to share personal experiences where persistence was important, and discuss feelings of patience or frustration

What can we learn from this Scripture about how we should pray or talk to God?

Help younger children see that they can talk to God anytime and should keep praying no matter what. For older children, discuss the importance of consistency and faith in prayer, even if answers aren't immediate.



Commentary

Notes:

A Bit of Background

During Jesus' time, widows were often very vulnerable. They didn't have the same legal rights as men, and without a husband or male relative to take care of them, they were often left without support. The widow in the story doesn't have anyone else to advocate for her, so she takes matters into her own hands by approaching the judge over and over again.

Judges in Jesus' time were expected to be fair and just, often making decisions in line with religious and moral laws. However, it seems the judge in this parable is more concerned with his own comfort than with justice. This would have struck Jesus' listeners because judges were meant to be upright models of fairness, especially in a society that valued religious teachings.

In Jewish teaching and thought, regular and sincere prayer was very important. This parable fits into that tradition by emphasizing not just the act of praying but the attitude we should have when we pray. Being persistent in our prayers shows that we truly believe in God's goodness and timing.





For early Christians who were probably facing persecution or feeling like their prayers weren't being answered, this parable would have been especially encouraging. It reassured them that God hears their cries and will bring justice, even if it takes time. It's a reminder that God's timing and justice are perfect, even when we can't see it immediately. So, just like the widow, we're encouraged to keep knocking, keep asking, and keep believing.

What's Going On?

In Luke 18:1-8, we find a parable—a short story meant to teach a lesson—told by Jesus to His disciples. This particular parable is about a persistent widow and an unjust judge, highlighting the importance of persistent prayer and faith. Jesus tells this story to make a point about how we should always pray and not lose heart, even when it feels like we're not getting answers.

This story is quite clever because it uses extremes to make its point. On one side, you have a judge who couldn't care less about doing the right thing, and on the other, a widow who is determined to get what she needs. Jesus uses this contrast to teach us that if even an uncaring judge can give in to persistence, how much more will a loving God respond to our prayers? This parable encourages us not to get discouraged in our prayer lives and reminds us that God is attentive and just, unlike the judge.

Luke 18:1-8 CSB

Now he told them a parable on the need for them to pray always and not give up. "There was a judge in a certain town who didn't fear God or respect people. And a widow in that town kept coming to him, saying, 'Give me justice against my adversary.' For a while he was unwilling, but later he said to himself, 'Even though I don't fear God or respect people, yet because this widow keeps pestering me, I will give her justice, so that she doesn't wear me out by her persistent coming." Then the Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. Will not God grant justice to his elect who cry out to him day and night? Will he delay helping them? I tell you that he will swiftly grant them justice. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"
