## A Man Born Blind Taking The Religious Leaders To School: The Third Messianic Miracle

We are closing out Season 4 by looking at the last section of the third messianic miracle.

### Introduction

**Recap:** Last week on *The Forgotten Jesus Podcast*, we looked at the man born blind and why that was the final of the three messianic miracles.

Take a few minutes to discuss this season. What were some of the most impactful moments for you?

### Discussion

Have someone read aloud [John 9:16-34](#)

1. What is the significance of healing someone born blind instead of someone who became blind?
2. Why was excommunication from the synagogue such a big deal for the first century Jews?
3. What does the blind man's response to the Pharisees in verses 26-34 tell us about their understanding of the Messiah?

Have someone read aloud [John 9:35-41](#)

4. What theological truths do we see taught through the man's healing?

### Application:



Take some time to apply what you have discussed.

1. How important is a community in your life, and how would you feel if you lost that community?
2. How does your testimony point to Jesus?
3. How does a good understanding of the Gospel and Scriptures work with your testimony to repel lies and share the truth?

Activity: At your next meeting, allow everyone to share their testimony. Consider an appropriate time limit for each testimony based on the size of your group.

## **Pray**

Share prayer requests and pray as a group at the end of your conversation. Here is a prompt:

Pray that the Lord would use your testimony to advance the Kingdom of God and bring people to Himself.
